Getting Back to Campus



"I don't know which school option is best for my child."

Given the current local and global uncertainties, many families are exploring education opportunities. When you share about your experience and encourage other parents to check out Columbia, you help the school continue to grow and impact the lives of students.

Columbia's Safety Committee comprises 12 faculty and staff members who met throughout the summer, making preparations for the anticipated campus reopening of Fall 2020. Collectively, the team spent over 200 hours developing a comprehensive Reentry Operations Blueprint to submit to the local health authorities and the Oregon Department of Education in mid-August.

Due to ever-changing guidelines from the state, the plan was adapted many times. Originally intending to have all students on campus for in-person learning, the team had to make adjustments when guidance was modified by the government in late-July to restrict classroom use - even for small, independent schools like Columbia, until county health metrics for COVID cases are improved.

Despite these unexpected announcements and setbacks, the committee always prioritized the best experience for Columbia students and families. Included in the plan:

- Columbia will begin school on September 2nd utilizing Comprehensive Distance Learning (CDL) with plans to implement limited in-person instruction.
- The in-person option allows the school to bridge CDL with instruction time on campus to provide better academic support, build educator-to-student relationships, support live peer-to-peer interaction, build school community and culture, increase engagement and attendance, and provide social, emotional, and mental health support. These elements are crucial to the learning process.
- Columbia will provide families with choice. When Multnomah County's population meets the health metrics (which would allow Columbia to bring all students back to the classroom for 5-day-a-week instruction), some families will want to continue with CDL. The school supports this choice and will provide synchronous learning for those students.
- Kindergarten through 3rd grade will likely be able to return to in-school instruction earlier under metric allowances. It is understood that younger students need access to in-person instruction to build literacy and numeracy skills critical to their continued learning.
- Classroom accommodations were made to meet the various needs of class size and quality instruction in support of the 35-square-feet per person requirement. Columbia is dedicated to providing a safe, quality learning environment for the students and families they serve.
- Teacher professional development was facilitated throughout the summer to best prepare Columbia faculty for CDL. Trainings were specifically targeted toward practical technology skills to effectively meet the critical needs of educators and students.

As President Ami Vensel shared in one of her encouraging messages to the school community, "It's been an unprecedented year. Yet - the family at Columbia Christian continues to be devoted to supporting our students to thrive and remain faithful as we navigate these challenging times together."

Teacher Technology Training




High school teacher Mr. Kopra participates in technology training in August

Shawn Daley, former Chief Innovation Officer and professor at Concordia University, provided comprehensive technology training for Columbia Christian's faculty in August. Starting with a survey to evaluate the teachers' experiences and abilities, Daley then facilitated multiple zoom sessions focused on digital methods and pedagogy. Segmented into elementary, middle, and high school levels, each teacher group received training in video conferencing components, preparing and presenting digital segments, and utilizing various platforms for distance learning.

Columbia students benefit from the expertise and abilities of their teachers as they connect from the classroom to the home during times of comprehensive digital learning. Parents can be assured that Columbia's faculty are equipped and prepared to effectively instruct through digital methods. The end result is students who are highly engaged and productive learners.

AP Student Success

Columbia Christian School offers a variety of AP (Advanced Placement), College Credit Dual Enrollment, and Honors courses for high school students. They are pleased to report the success of their AP English Literature students from the past school year – their participants had a pass rate of nearly 90%!

English instructor Mrs. Wetzler shared with the students: "Your hard work, perseverance, and dedication over the last quarter of the school year have paid off. Passing the AP Literature test is no small feat, and I am thrilled for your success. You have demonstrated beyond doubt that you are ready for the rigors of college academic writing and analysis. To put this into perspective, of the approximately 334,000 students who took the test globally, only 60% passed the test. I hope this achievement brings you confidence as you continue your academic pursuits."

COVID Financial Aid

Did you know that Columbia Christian School awards over \$300,000 in need-based financial aid each year? This important ministry enables the school to serve a population of students who come from families of diverse economic backgrounds. Now, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the need for tuition assistance is greater than ever!

Beyond the typical assistance requests, Columbia's committee is reviewing applications from families who have lost jobs, had significant pay cuts, their unemployment hasn't come through or is inconsistent, their businesses are going under, or a variety of other scenarios. More families are applying for tuition help, and the amounts required to support them are greater.

The school has already gifted over \$29,000 in extra aid specifically to families experiencing hardship because of the pandemic and the goal is to raise at least \$30,000 for this cause. Columbia's Board and administration want to help these families weather this storm so they can keep their kids at Columbia until their situation improves. They are seeking donor support to help bridge the gap to keep these kids at Columbia while their family navigates these challenging times.

It's a big deal! As we approach a new school year with the restrictions of COVID-19, parents are desperately looking to find ways to support their child to be successful with online learning.
