Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and the governor-mandated closure of all K-12 campuses in the state of Oregon, these seniors finished the last three months of their classes through distance learning. Displaying impressive resiliency, they embraced the less-than-ideal situation and completed their high school career from home – utilizing iPads, Zoom sessions, and Google Classroom.



For safety reasons, and in line with county health guidelines, the commencement ceremony on June 12 was moved outdoors. Immediate family was invited to participate by setting up their chairs in a painted circle on the soccer field – designated by a sign including their graduate's name and photo. Other relatives, friends, and supporters connected to the event remotely via Facebook Live. With the Womack Fountain bubbling in the background, and a light sprinkling of rain overhead, the students of honor were recognized for their success.

Salutatorian Parker Reed offered a brief welcome, followed by a few wise words from Valedictorian Mike Jiang. Principal Joel Davis presented certificates to standout students in the class including: Spiritual Leadership Award (Cameron Stark), Timothy Award (Dylan Lawrence), Mr. CCHS (Mike Jiang), and Miss CCHS (Evelyn Barrett).



Beloved social studies teacher Jake Kopra was invited by the class to be the guest speaker – his message punctuated by his infamous "dad jokes".



Diplomas were conferred by President Ami Vensel and Board Chairman David Tucker. Among the class of 2020 graduates were 9 Distinguished Scholar Diploma recipients, 12 National Honor Society Members, 5 Scholar Athletes, and 26 young men and women ready to be sent out into the world to do great things for God's Kingdom. # Hindsight is 2020

Ask any of the Columbia Christian administrators, faculty, students, and families about the end of the 2019-2020 school year, and they will tell you that it was completely unexpected. No one could have predicted the global health crisis, the national quarantines, and the decision by Oregon governor Kate Brown in mid-March to close campuses of all K-12 schools in the state. Despite the unprecedented challenges faced by the Columbia community, everyone rallied together to end the year strong.

Distance learning became the new norm and Columbia teachers wasted no time in implementing education methods away from the classroom. From Google Classroom collaborating and Zoom Sessions, to printed take-home packets and lots of personal home deliveries from teachers, Columbia faculty made the very best of the situation. In contrast with many local public schools, Columbia students were held accountable for "attendance", required to continue participating and progressing in their classes, and challenged to demonstrate proficiency with their skills.

Since they were home with their children during this time, many parents had to step up and become a more integral part of the education process during this season. Their gratitude toward the work of the teachers was clearly expressed in their phone calls, emails, and letters to the school – especially after President Ami Vensel hosted personal "Town Hall Meetings" online for families in every grade level.

  - High School Graduation Drive Thru






### **Gym Floor Replacement!**

Built in 1964, the Columbia Christian School gymnasium has been the site for many athletic competitions, PE classes, assemblies, ceremonies, and other events over the decades. Unfortunately, after more than 50 years of continual use, the gym is deteriorating. School administrators, supporters, and friends have formed a gymnasium upgrade committee led by Dave and Sid Astin, to support several much-needed improvements in the building.

The first project on the list was replacement of the playing surface and underlayment. Demolition of the old floor began in June 2020 and some issues were discovered. The original installment was not done properly which lead to many of the problems with the floor separating from the sub-flooring support, buckling, and bubbling. It was also revealed that the concrete pad was not level in many areas and that the volleyball system was installed improperly. Those are areas that are being now being addressed with the remodel.

With the replacement costs being originally quoted at \$105,000, and donor gifts in place for only a portion of those expenses, support is still needed.
