2nd Place Champs: #1 in Our Hearts



It was a storied season, but maybe not in the Hollywood sense. Coach Bart Valentine's varsity boys basketball made it to the the State Tournament, yet not undefeated. They could have waltzed into the State Tournament with a perfect record, except that they had accepted an invitation earlier this season to play in the Les Schwab Invitational. It was the ultimate longshot: the 2A state champs up against 5A and 6A powerhouses. In Round 1, they fell to Gonzaga Prep, who went on to win the large school State Championship in Washington. Round 2, however, our David slayed Goliath in the form of Southridge High School, a 6A public high school in Beaverton, OR. That win put Columbia Christian in the history books as the smallest school to ever be invited and win at the Invitational. And then they did it again in the final round against Barlow, coming back from 18 down to win in overtime.

Back in league play, they were ranked #1, and played like it. Columbia won 15 straight games to clench the District Championship for the fourth year in a row in a 67-44 game against Knappa. Their first round of State Tourney play was a no-contest contest, holding Union to only 36 points, while putting up their only 3-digit score of the season at 103. It seemed like the Knights were truly on the path to defending their title.

Their fate was still undecided when they came back from halftime in the Championship game, only



down by 3 points. But the final two periods didn't go the way the Knights hoped. Despite their talented efforts, they fell to Western Christian to finish as state runnersup. Ben Gregg and Elijah Munyan were unanimously selected to the 1st Team All-State.

"I was really proud of the team all year long," said Coach Valentine a few days after the final game. "We played at a really high level. Although we did not bring home the state championship, we really represented Columbia Christian well and demonstrated the character of Christ throughout the tournament. We are still a young team and will be back."

Board Member Spotlight: David Tucker

Dr. David Tucker grew up in Searcy, Arkansas, on the campus of Harding University. His father was the Chief Financial Officer; so Dr. Tucker became acquainted and comfortable with an academic campus early on. Tucker's

fondest memories of that time are the sporting events he viewed and participated in while on campus. He attended Harding Academy preschool through high school and went on to earn a BA in accounting and economics. He earned a master's in economics from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., and a PhD in economics from the University of Arkansas. Meanwhile, Tucker was

the Professor of Ecomonics at Harding Unversity. After the death of his first wife due to cancer, Tucker accepted a position at Cascade College. He moved himself and his two children onto the campus and began his story here in Portland.

Since his arrival, Tucker has become a dedicated and involved component to Columbia Christian School's operations. Having had life-long connections with Morgan and Judy Outlaw (Judy grew up a block away from him and used to babysit he and his brother, while Tucker used to watch Morgan play football at Harding), Tucker and his family quickly became involved with the campus and its



people, and Tucker decided to have his children attend Columbia. Since that decision, Tucker has been blessed by both the environment of Columbia and the people that created and maintained that environment. His children,

> much like himself, participated in and loved sports, setting records and achievements in their names. His daughter went on to play basketball for Harding University. His son is married to the youngest daughter of Columbia's president, Marquita Moss.

> Looking back, Tucker said that it was God's hand that led him and his children to Columbia. Tucker

continues to feel the Lord's hand on campus, and he strives to continue the work of improving the lives and futures of every student on campus. He also sees that the work of God led him to his wife, Lori, whom he met when they worked together at Cascade College, and all the other influential people who have supported him on his journey.

In their free time, the Tucker's enjoy attending Blazer games. Tucker also loves reading, hiking, and boating. His love for the Northwest is built upon the people here, especially those in the Columbia community. Dr. Tucker has served on the Columbia Christian Board for 10 years.

The Hamstreet House Renovation

Visitors to campus often notice a fixture near the Burnside entrance – a ranch-style home with brick work and tan paint that backs up to the Rehearsal Hall building. This home is fondly named the Hamstreet House, after Harold and Mona Hamstreet, the owners who generously donated the home and property to Columbia Christian School.

This building has seen some changes over the years. The home became the music house by the early 1970s and was renamed the Hamstreet Musik Haus. It hosted the college music program as well as the academy's band and music programs through 1993. From 1994 to 2009 the house was home to the Cascade College music program. After Columbia Christian School purchased the campus in 2012, the Hamstreet House became the part of the high school drama department, and was used mostly for storage.

With limited use in recent years, the home was showing signs of disrepair and in need of improvements. A friend of Columbia, Troi Barnum, agreed to help fix up the home in exchange for living in it. Her goal is to restore it to its 1950s roots, and progress is already evident.



Change of Address

You might notice that Columbia's address has changed to 9101 E Burnside St. Portland, OR 97216. This is not a new address, Columbia has simply reclaimed the mailbox that used to belong to Cascade College. This address also reflects a more prominent entrance and parking lot for guests to use.

Annual Fund Update from the Development Office

The importance of the Annual Fund is to cover the scholarships granted each year. The Annual Fund is broken down into efforts throughout the year that help bridge the gap between the cost of tuition and the financial needs of families.

As of March 8th, Columbia has already seen a significant participation increase in the levels of giving since the first part of December 2018.

Columbia has gained 50 new supporters who are giving at least \$120 annually. These donors represent a total of more than \$166,000 in new annual gifts to the school.



Read-a-thon: Record-Setting Reading



The 2019 Read-a-thon earned a 66% increase from 2018!

As the story unfolds, grades PreK–8th went on a journey through reading and recorded over 108,000 minutes collectively. The top reader, a 5th grade student, recorded 4,825 minutes. The Read-a-thon promotes the joy of reading and the importance of raising money for improvements in the Columbia Christian library as well as resources in the classroom.

The Read-a-thon was organized through an online program this year and sparked a whole new level of excitement. In fact, a higher percentage of students participated, recording minutes from in-class reading sessions, as well as on their own time. Two classes, 3rd grade and 4th grade, recorded 100% class participation.

The online program allowed friends and family to watch their students progress

and more donations came in as a result. The initial goal was set to raise \$4,000 after 10 days, but as the Read-a-thon came to a close, more than \$6,400 was raised.

Church Historians & Theologians currently are in a season of marking the 500-year anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. One of the great principles of the Sixteenth-Century Reformation is that scripture alone (sola scriptura) is the primary authority for the Christian faith, and this remains a foundational value of Evangelical Christianity today. This class explores the History of the Bible and its status as authoritative Word of God. The first part of the course focuses on the History of the Bible and its textual reliability, the Canon, and early English translations, while the second part examines the Bible's own testimony about its nature and authority and unpacks the important doctrine of inspiration. The class aims to be intellectually stimulating as well as spiritually edifying.
