On Friday, June 9, the tassels were turned and the class of 2023 officially completed their high school career. Government President Dawson Vensel welcomed the audience and shared the class scripture: Ecclesiastes 4:9-12. Valedictorian Frank Adams and Salutatorian Braden Lawrence each shared words of wisdom. Spanish/ English teacher Sam Schultz was selected as the speaker, and a vocal duo performed "The Blessing" (sophomores Elizabeth Adams and Ariel Howarth). Special awards were presented by Principal Deborah Miller including the Timothy Award (Frank Adams & Fiat Thaweesuksathian), Spiritual Leadership Award (Frank Adams), Mr. CCHS (Dawson Vensel), and Miss CCHS (Lisa Hartwich). Diplomas were conferred by Dr. Miller, President Ami Vensel, and Board Chair Robert Gentry.

The fourteen graduates were a small and diverse group. Some of the seniors had been part of the Columbia Christian family since preschool, while others joined at various times through elementary, middle, and even high school. One student was from Germany; one was from Thailand. Considering academics, there were two distinguished scholars, six honor students, and five scholar athletes. East Coast Trip 2023











With stops at many historical sites in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, and Washington DC, a group of 22 Columbia students from 8th and 9th grade enjoyed an 8-day trip to the East Coast in June.

The travelers hit the ground running after a red-eye flight across the country. Their first two days were in Boston, featuring Beacon Hill, Boston Tea Party Museum, USS Constitution, Harvard Square, Boston Marathon Memorial, Old North Church, Lexington, Concord, Boston Public Library, and Candlepin Bowling. Days three and four were spent in New York - Central Park, Rockefeller Center, Times Square, Top of the Rock, Ellis Island/Statue of Liberty, Battery Park, 9-11 Memorial, Broadway Show, and more! On the fifth day, they visited many notable spots in Philadelphia: Independence Hall, Liberty Bell, Betsy Ross House, Elfreth's Alley, Christ Church, and the Rocky Statue. The grand finale was spending days six, seven, and eight in Washington DC with highlights like The Capitol Building, Mt. Vernon, Old Town Alexandria, Smithsonian Museums, Supreme Court, Arlington National Cemetery, Library of Congress, Holocaust Museum, National Archives, and many monuments and memorial sites.

Natalie Bishop, one of the faculty advisors for the excursion, has gone on trips like this since 2003. She said, "Every year I have gone there are new things to discover and learn. My favorite part of the trip is seeing the students get super excited about all the historically important things we see. One of the most important places I've seen change was 9-11 Ground Zero into the beautiful memorial that it is now."

Track & Field Recap

Kevin Yaws, who has been coaching close to thirty years, headed up Columbia's Track & Field program once again in 2023. This past year, twenty athletes participated in high school Track & Field and forty-nine in middle school. According to Yaws, "Track & Field is the ultimate team sport, as all students of varying abilities and talents join together to score points in different events to make up the overall team score. We also strive to build closer relationships with Christ and each other while sharing His example."

He shared further, "The highlights of the season were our three athletes who qualified for the State meet in Eugene. It was a joy to have Frank Adams qualify for his third straight State competition and score for the team. Landon Reid qualified with the discus and placed 6th while Logan White scored by placing 4th in the 300 hurdles. Besides these significant accomplishments, other memorable aspects include all of the personal records that our athletes set throughout the year, our team growing closer together, and learning to encourage and support each other."

In conclusion, he commented, "I could spend a lot of time talking about the sports history at Columbia. We have one state record that was set in the 3000m by Makena Houston at the 2A State meet in 2022! However, I'll choose to focus on the future of our Track & Field team — it looks very bright as I see the students who are coming up through our elementary and middle school!"

Summer Projects

Although in many ways the campus is quieter in the summer months with all the students away, there are still a number of facilities projects that keep Columbia's crew busy. This year, there were four particular areas of focus:

Digital Network Upgrade





Thanks to a generous grant from the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust, our IT department – headed by Donnie Alcatraz and assisted by Erik Walthinsen – undertook the massive task of increasing the campus Wi-Fi coverage and speed. Included in the project was the pulling of old wiring (500lbs worth!) and replacing it with about one mile of new Ethernet cable and optical fiber. Fourteen wireless access points in classrooms were replaced with thirty-one newer access points, ensuring strong signals in every space. The old equipment was donated to Free Geek, an organization that provides computers and tech to people in need. One of the humorous aspects of the project was the infamous bird's nest in a junction box at the Outlaw Center.

7th/8th Grade Knights Nook





If you've been in Sanders Hall in recent weeks, you likely heard the buzzing of a saw or pounding of a hammer. The new Knights Nook was constructed in the upper south end of the building as a special zone for our 7th and 8th grade students. Inside they have extra storage for their gym/sports bags as well as an area to socialize and spend time with friends. Much appreciation goes to Mr. Terry Franceschi and friends who worked tirelessly to complete it in time. It's a great space – come check it out!

Supporter Spotlight





Columbia Bookkeeper Dixie Bever announced her retirement this summer. The school wishes to express its immense gratitude for her work to support Christian education.

Although Dixie never personally attended Columbia, her connections to the school and the campus run deep. She was originally introduced to Columbia in 1985 when her family moved to Vancouver. She shared, "The church we attended (Vancouver Church of Christ) had several families with children enrolled at Columbia. When it came time for our own children to start school (1987 & 1991), we weren't sure if we would put them in private school or public school. I had planned to observe both Columbia and the elementary school that was in our district. However, after meeting with Mrs. Ort (the 1st grade teacher at the time) we decided to not look any further. Our children remained at Columbia through the 6th grade (1993 & 1997).

Another important connection with this campus developed when Dixie's husband, Ralph, worked as the Maintenance Supervisor for Cascade College from 2003 to 2009. At that time, Cascade was occupying the south part of the campus where Columbia Christian now has high school classes, the gym, cafeteria, rehearsal hall, apartments, etc. When Cascade College ceased its operations in 2009, Dixie, Ralph, and Joe (their son) managed the property during the interim before it was purchased by Columbia Christian in 2012. That is the same year that Dixie was hired by CCS as the Bookkeeper. She skillfully served in that role for eleven years until announcing her retirement as of this summer.

When asked about her favorite memories at Columbia, Dixie commented, "Mrs. Ort said, 'I teach children, not subjects', entering the school and feeling God's presence of peace during the 'COVID Chaos'. Walking the 'Jericho Walk' around the campus, praying over it, and releasing the concerns and dreams for the campus to God. This walk was implemented by Kevin Reed during his time as President. What I appreciate about Columbia were the teachers who encouraged our children in their understanding of God, gave them a strong academic foundation, held them accountable, and cared for them."
