Campus & Facilities Projects

The summer months on Columbia's campus are a whirlwind of activity for the facilities department. Each school year, as the last day of school comes to an end, the facilities team begins the countdown to school starting again. The focus of summer projects at Columbia is student and staff safety, maintenance deferred during the school year, and the deeper cleaning that is possible with emptier buildings. Columbia summer projects range from large-scale contracted construction projects to the tedious and mundane task of removing gum from the underside of desks.

One of this summer's projects was extensive masonry work at the Landreth and York Halls. York and Landreth Hall are CMU block construction with a brick veneer. Due to the age of the buildings and water intrusion. several areas were in need of repairs to the brick veneer. The structural integrity of the building is sound, but some of the cosmetic issues with the veneer had created safety issues that needed to be addressed. This project required high pressure washing to remove all organic matter, removal of several hundred bricks from the south side of Landreth Hall, the removal by grinding mortar that had deteriorated around the entire structure, repointing all of the removed mortar, rebuilding the south wall with the removed bricks, and a masonry sealing on the entire building to protect from future deterioration. All of Columbia's masonry buildings are on maintenance schedule to have the brickwork treated and repaired in the future.

After the masonry repairs were completed on York and Landreth Halls, the roofing project began on Landreth Hall. The existing roof material and a portion of decking are being removed. A correct roof slope will be rebuilt to facilitate proper drainage and a new membrane roof will be installed. Columbia has been very blessed to partner with MVP Commercial Roofing for many years. Chris is always repairing or replacing our roofs at great discount, but never sacrifices the quality of the end product.

Another project this summer has been the construction of a new restroom facility for faculty and staff use in the Morgan and Judy Outlaw Center for Academic Excellence. That building had been without a dedicated restroom for faculty and staff for many generations. A closet area adjacent to restrooms outside of the kindergarten and 1st grade classrooms has been remodeled into a small, beautiful space for faculty and staff. The project costs were kept very low as the location of the new bathroom was previously a bathroom! The project was able to utilize existing water supply lines and plumbing drains that had been terminated in the walls and floor.

Additional savings were achieved with repurposed materials already available on campus including the flooring, sink, cabinet base, and paint, electrical, and plumbing supplies.

Columbia was also greatly blessed with volunteers completing summer projects around campus. These projects include Thomas Carter rebuilding the entry to the Farris Johnson Student Center, Dan Carver moving the junior and senior high lockers to the Student Center, The Park Church of Christ from Tulsa Oklahoma rehabbing classroom S103 in J. P. Sanders Hall, and various outdoor projects from regular volunteers like Jim Brown and the summer mission trip youth.

Along with the larger projects and our team of volunteers, summer work also includes many fresh coats of paint, new carpet, 1000's of square feet of carpet cleaned, an old furnace room converted to a new custodial center in the Outlaw Center, new whiteboards in some installed classrooms. restrooms and classrooms deepcleaned from top to bottom, and windows cleaned inside and out. Summer also requires that the yearround tasks are kept up as well. From constant grounds maintenance to keep the campus beautiful, to the cleaning and management of our third-party campus rentals, summer is busy and productive!

In Memory of Ida Partlow



Ida Pearl (Mathews) Partlow, age 85, passed peacefully from this life on July 6, in her Portland home following her battle with pancreatic cancer. She was born on December 20, 1938, in Post, Texas, to Fred and Stella Faye (Blassingame) Mathews. Ida moved to Ontario, Oregon, as a child and was a founding member of the Ontario Church of Christ. After graduating from Ontario High School, she relocated to Portland where she lived out her adult life. She met and married Dean Partlow and they raised their five children primarily in the purple house on Oak Street while also opening their home to many others.

Ida and Myron Dean Partlow, Jr. (1936-2003) married in 1957 and had four sons: Steven (Kalene) of Oregon City, Oregon; Timothy (Angie) of Mt. Juliet, Tennessee; David (Jeanie) of Oregon City, Oregon; and Jonathan (Cile) of Lucasville, Ohio; and adopted a beautiful girl, Deanna (Jack) of Washougal, Washington. Ida and Dean have fourteen grandchildren: Alexander (Kaylin), Lynn (Steve), Joshua (Stephanie), Aaron (Lauren), Abigail (James), Taylor (Derek), Anna (Connor), Alydia, Jonathan Jr., Timothy, Matthew (Joanna), Thaddeus, Ava, and Ariel. Ida has eleven great grandchildren, and many others who called her "mom" or "Aunt Ida."

Ida was passionate about ministry and moving the gospel forward. Not only did she serve her church in Ontario, but she was a member of Central Church of Christ when their building was constructed in southeast Portland. Since it was just a few blocks from her home, the family often walked to church services and activities. Later, as a longtime member (nearly 50 years) of the Eastside Church of Christ, Ida devoted her time to teaching, building the library, helping in the kitchen, and supporting the Mien congregation that met in the basement of the church building during its early years. The Mien congregation affectionately gave her the name "Duty Seng" which could be translated "Lovely Big Sister." Not only did Ida teach Bible classes in churches for over seventy years, but she also taught many students from around the world through World English Institute (WEI). In addition, in her "retirement" she made WEI mission trips to Albania and Cambodia.

Ida's ministry went beyond church-specific activities. She served for 10 years (1974-1984) as the librarian for Columbia Christian School. Many former students and teachers have fondly remembered the library as a safe place where they felt accepted and encouraged. During that time, she served as the time-clock official for the high school basketball games. Even before her involvement as an employee, Ida was an active member of Women for Columbia. A passionate seamstress, Ida used her talents to sew clothing for various charitable organizations. She often altered or created clothing for people at a cost that they could afford. She knitted and crocheted hats, and was a member of Eastside's quilting group.

Ida's memory lives on today in many ways, one of which is the dedication above the doors of Columbia Christian School library: Dean & Ida Partlow Library.
