
to the challenge and delivered a masterful performance. I appreciate all the work they did in rehearsals, as well as the work they did on their own practicing their songs and choreography at home."

Since the beginning, Columbia Christian School has been blessed by generous donations in diverse forms. From auction items to classroom supplies, people who believe in the Kingdom-work at Columbia have always stepped up and supported the school when there was a need to be met.

The school's current work truck, graciously donated by Ralph and Dixie Bever, has been effectively serving the campus for decades. As it approaches 30 years of age, the vehicle is beginning to seriously show its wear and tear with transmission and engine issues. In response, the facilities department and the business office began looking for an opportunity to find a replacement. Mark Beekman received word of a fleet of trucks being sold by a company that was going out of business. He was simultaneously in communication with an anonymous donor wanting to bless Columbia in a tangible way. What great timing and opportunity! God works all the time!

Columbia has now replaced the old work truck with a 2021 Ford F350 Super Duty diesel pickup. This capable vehicle will provide many years of service to the school. The facilities department is deeply thankful to be blessed in this way by individuals who love the school and by the ever-present providence of God.

#### Vensel's Voice



At Columbia, we are big believers in the value of partnership with our parents. This relationship offers parents the opportunity to provide valuable feedback concerning our efforts in pursing excellence. We seek to gain clarity on what we are doing well, and areas we need to focus on developing.

We are grateful to all who participated in our Annual Parent Survey this past winter. The results were encouraging, affirming, and insightful. It is clear our school community sees Columbia in a very positive light. Out of 900 Christian schools who also completed this survey, Columbia ranked in the 60th percentile (solidly above average). The data tells us that our parents find the following items highly important:

- Christian program elements (Biblical worldview, Christian character development, etc.)
- Leadership (administration provides staff oversight, parent concerns are addressed, etc.)
- Teacher quality (care & concern for students, up-to-date on teaching methodology, etc.)

We were pleased to see strong scores in these particular areas. Despite the changes we've experienced in our administration over the past year, we have worked hard to establish a strong team of leaders among our faculty and staff. We are grateful to see these efforts are producing measurable results!

Other areas of strength included: administration provides educational vision for the school, teachers are engaging, positive school community, staff is customer-service oriented, curriculum is up-to-date, and the financial stability of the school.

Another important piece of the survey is addressing concerns that were shared. Following are some areas that parents highlighted for improvement: behavioral standards students, addressing concerns of bullying, reinforcing parental values, spiritual disciplines are learned, and school safety. We are glad to be aware of these perspectives. Our team is using this information to identify and prioritize specific methods for growth.

Our first area of focus relates to behavioral standards and discipline consistency. We are now in the process of talking with students and parents regarding their experience and perspectives, learning the specific issues that need to be addressed. Additionally, we are revisiting our Student and Parent Handbook to ensure that expectations and policies are clear and purposeful. We will also make a concerted effort to better communicate with students and parents when social, behavioral, or academic concerns arise.

We are also moving forward in the other areas of needed improvement. We will be taking a closer look at our teaching of spiritual disciplines. We intend to highlight this as a focus in our curriculum and instruction across grade levels. Our Safety Committee has been recently expanded to help evaluate and respond to issues related to campus safety. This is an ongoing need in our local community and something we take seriously.

Survey results this year revealed additional details specific to our three school segments: elementary, middle, and high school. We were thrilled to learn that our high school program was rated at the top end. Among over 400 Christian high schools in the U.S. included in the survey, Columbia ranked in the 80th percentile. That means we are in the top 20% of satisfaction! Biblical worldview was indicated as a notable strength in our high school. Our elementary program ranked in the 60th percentile (above average), and our middle school program ranked in the 43rd percentile (slightly below average). This data is helpful as we further determine areas of strength and focus.

Overall, the survey process is a very helpful tool for our organization. As key stakeholders of Columbia Christian, your feedback is always welcome, appreciated, and taken seriously. May God continue to bless the work and ministry of Columbia Christian School!
